Deborah's story

Deborah James, known as 'Bowelbabe', was diagnosed with bowel cancer in 2016 at the age of 35. She was a tireless campaigner and fundraiser, sharing her cancer experience with unflinching honesty to raise awareness and smash taboos around talking about poo and the symptoms of bowel cancer.

In May 2022, Deborah announced that the time had come to stop treatment and receive palliative care at home. On June 28 2022, Deborah's family announced that she had died peacefully, surrounded by her loved ones.

The Bowelbabe Fund for Cancer Research UK was set up to continue Deborah's incredible legacy. Funding cutting-edge research into early detection,

personalised medicine, and raising awareness of the signs and symptoms of cancer to give more people affected by cancer more time with the people they love.
